MODULE DESCRIPTION

Module Aims	This module explores global political and economic dynamics and their implications for organisations and international relations. Students examine power structures, global stability, and the interplay between economics and strategy. The module fosters the ability to formulate and compare geopolitical perspectives in diverse contexts.
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Teaching Arrangement	Class time will be devoted to lectures by the instructor, in-class exercises linked to lectures, and discussions on readings. In addition, students are expected to read the recommended chapters and articles and to solve the exercises related to each session. The module material (slides and exercises) is available to students through the school extranet.
Learning Outcomes	By the end of this module, students should be able to: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Critically analyse global political and economic dynamics and their impact on organisations, territories, and international relations. 2. Develop evidence-based geopolitical analyses on key global issues, distinguishing between critical analysis and personal opinion. 3. Evaluate the interplay between economic prosperity, power relations, and global stability in shaping geopolitical strategies. 4. Synthesise and compare geopolitical perspectives in a collaborative environment, demonstrating cultural awareness and strategic thinking.

Session 3: The Toolbox of Geopolitical Analysis

Content:

- Multidisciplinary views on several essential points (resource geography, demography, history, etc.)

Assignments:

- Each of the multidisciplinary viewpoints will be addressed through the use of texts and cases

Session 4: Applying the Toolbox Through Illustration and Practice

Content:

- Crossed views in 3 dimensions: how to develop a critical look to understand what geopolitics is for in tomorrow's world
- For illustrative and non-exhaustive purposes:
 - Belt and Road Initiative and the planned vision of a sinocentric world
 - The Trump Administration and its legacy: "Make America (still) Great (Again)!"
 - Brexit and the European Union: the (real) end of geopolitical utopia with a vocation
 - The climate and its disruption: political stakes and stakes for civilisation

Session 5: Presentation Workshop

Content:

- Workshop for the presentation of students' work and cross reflection with other groups
- Selection of geopolitical themes with an established pre-list and possibility of having chosen subjects that will have been already validated in previous sessions by the faculty

Assignments:

- Various sources chosen and argued by the students
- Critical approach to the selection of references

Session 6: Continuation of Work Initiated in Sessions 4 and 5

Content:

- Presentations by working groups with a dynamic session: each group is criticised in an interactive debate
- Presentation with PowerPoint or video support
 - Possible construction of original computer graphics

Assignments:

- Prepare group presentations
